Climate Conferences 2019: global negotiations & local action



96% of the Solihull students are somewhat or very concerned about Climate Change

What are Climate Conferences?

40 students from 5 secondary schools & colleges took part in a Climate Conference in the Council Chambers, Solihull Civic Suite as part of InterClimate Network's *Climate Voices* 2019 programme. Modelled on the **UN Conference of the Parties**, preparation for and participation in the first session enabled students to improve their grasp and understanding of the complex world of politics, climate science and global policy that is integral to climate change negotiations.

Local Action sessions focused attention on key areas where we can all make a difference, including in school: *Energy; Food; Transport; What we buy and use*. During this marketplace, students gained essential exposure to and inspiration from local initiatives and sustainability leaders; whilst the 'green' community welcomed the opportunity to share their expertise & give feedback on the many ideas of young change-makers.

How are students already supporting Climate Action in school?

- 56% of students told us they recycle at school
- 44% said they have not yet had the opportunity to support climate action in school
- **37%** students* feel that they can make a difference in their school and community
- 4% said they are part of an Eco-group

... and outside school

81% are 'helping my family to recycle'48% are 'trying to reduce energy use at home'

22% said they're 'thinking about own choices eg clothes, products, food'

22% are 'talking about what we eat at home'

Post-conference survey: Solihull students' feedback



68% students, up from 33%, believe Local Decision-Makers take notice of what young people think

What support do Solihull students want?

- 58% want help to run a school-based event or workshop to get more people involved
- 56% want advice and guidance on their Climate Action
- 47% want to link with local schools and local organisations that can help

...and what will they do as a result of the conference?

79% said they will 'Influence family and friends'

41% will 'Join an Eco-group'

6% said they will 'Write to your Councillor or MP'

33% of teachers said that their students' Climate Action ideas are feasible

Where does 'Climate Action fit in school

- 50% teachers said that it fits with their school Eco-group
- 50% said it's a teacher-led initiative only
- 25% said a lead teacher has responsibility
- 25%said their senior leadership team prioritise it across all curricular areas

...and would follow-up support be of interest?

- 2 schools of 3 who responded to these questions said
- yes to follow up visit / workshop
- interested in a joint school workshop and a local teacher group
- being connected with relevant local organisations
- Local / national show-casing for their schools' work

What have been the learning benefits?

Greater comprehension of global climate issues Research, analysis, debating, teamwork Public speaking, articulacy, critical thinking Real world & cultural capital. Confidence Awareness of need to involve others in school
